HISTORY OF CHINA AND EAST ASIA

1421- The Year China Discovered America, By Gavin Menzies, William Morrow (2003). At the beginning of the Ming Dynasty in China, Emperor Zhu Di, having defeated the Mongols, set out to build the infrastructure and 'global' capabilities of his new state. He moved the capital to Beijing and built the Forbidden City as the Emperor's capital. He rebuilt and extended the Grand Canal, linking Beijing with southern China in a transportation system that remains today. But perhaps his most ambitious effort was the building of vast navies, in the shipyards of Nanjing that would explore and colonize the world. This book is about how these explorations to East Asia, Australia, South America, the Antarctic, Africa and America, and the Chinese settlements that resulted. However, when the great Chinese fleets returned home to China, their emperor was dead, the Forbidden City destroyed by fire and the new Emperor firmly committed to a period of austerity. The fleets were destroyed along with 'all evidence' and citizens of China were forbidden to travel abroad. China turned inward and remained on this course for the next five hundred and fifty years. What messages does this have for today? Could America, stretched beyond its limits financially as it battles what it sees as threats to world order, turn inward as China did? Even after space exploration and a man on the moon and the amazing technological progress of its time - is this possible? Will China rise again to be the "Middle Kingdom"? Gavin Menzies is a retired Submarine Commander in the British Royal Navy. His career experience brought him to many of the shores that the Chinese explored. His research network around the world is building a fascinating story with new evidence every day that supports what the Chinese were doing in 1421. 1688 A Global History, John E. Willis, Jr., W. W. Norton & Company, New York and London, (2001). The author has merged cultural anthropology and history to reflect through the prism of a single year the shape of the world poised on the edge of modernity. It touches on events in Africa, the New World, China, Japan, Australia and eastern and western Europe. We go from the world of the Kangxi emperor in China to that of an African Muslim slave in the New World. It is a vivid picture of life in 1688, filled with terrifying violence, frightening diseases and religious and political persecution, but also with comfortingly familiar human kindness, familial affections and the scientific and intellectual achievements of Leibniz, Locke and Newton, among others. Dragon Pearl, Growing Up Among China's Elite, Sirin Phathanothai, Simon & Schuster (1994). Born into one of Thailand's prominent political families, the author was sent as a young girl to live and be brought up in China under the direct auspices of Premier Zhou Enlai as his ward. East Asia at The Center, Fourth Thousand Years of Engagement with the World, Warren I. Cohen, Columbia University Press, (2001). From the prehistoric formation of political units in East Asia a mature international system arose that was centered on the Chinese Han and Tang dynasties, though Central Asia, Japan, Korea, and Southeast Asia each rejected or even dominated China at times. This system was successively disrupted by the Mongols, the coming of Islam, the capitalist maritime world system, and the Japanese empire's disastrous attempt to take up the mantle of imperialism from the colonialists. Nathaniel's Nutmeg, The True and Incredible Adventures of the Spice Trader Who Changed the Course of History, Giles Melton, Farrar, Straus, and Giroux, New York (1999). Would you believe that nutmeg formed the basis of one of the most bitter international conflicts of the 17th century, and was also intimately connected to New York City's rise to global preeminence? The book deals with the competition between England and Holland for possession of the spice-producing islands of Southeast Asia throughout the 17th century. At the center of the action lies Nathaniel Courthope, a trusty lieutenant of the East India Company, who took and held the tiny nutmeg-producing island of Run in the face of overwhelming Dutch opposition for more than five years, before being treacherously murdered in 1620. To avenge his death, and the loss of the island, the British took the Dutch North American colony at Manhattan. ISBN# 0-374-21936-2

When China Ruled the Seas: The Treasure Fleet of the Dragon Throne, 1405-1433,

Louise Levathes, Oxford University Press, New York & Oxford, (1994). The story of seven epic voyages made by unique junk armadas during the reign of the Chinese emperor Zhu Di. These "treasure ships" under the command of the eunuch admiral Zheng He traded in porcelain, silk, lacquerware and fine-art objects; they sailed from Korea and Japan throughout the Malay archipelago and India to East Africa, and possibly as far away as Australia. Levathes argues that China could have employed its navy--with some 3000 vessels, the largest in history until the present century--to establish a great colonial empire 100 years before the age of European exploration and expansion; instead, the Chinese abruptly dismantled their navy. Levathes describes the political showdown that led to this perverse turn of events, revolving around a clash between the powerful eunuch class and Confucian scholar-officials. ISBN# 0-19-511207-5

Being Chinese, *Voices from the Diaspora*, Wei Djao, University of Arizona Press, (2003). The author explores the nature of the overseas Chinese population and its selective adherence to shared "Chinese values" through the personal stories of twenty two different people's lives around the world. For centuries, people of Chinese ancestry have traveled and lived all over the world from the U.S., Canada, Cuba, Zimbabwe, Peru to Southeast Asia etc. What makes someone Chinese? Is it merely physical characteristics or does it run deeper to include shared aspirations, values, goals and behavior? The author was born in China and now lives in the U.S. This book is an account of her journey around the world to tell the story of China's Diaspora.

<u>A Million Truths</u>, A Decade in China, Linda Jakobson, M. Evans and Company, Inc., New York, (1998). Linda Jakobson describes the changes that have been taking place in China over the last decade. The descriptions are a result of personal interviews with Chinese of all ages and ranks during Jakobson's time living in China as a Finnish foreign correspondent. A deep psychological analysis of Chinese political culture manifested in traditional, Republican and Communist periods. The author scans several possible paths of future development and discusses the great gap that persists between the worlds of the political leadership and of society at large in post-Tiananmen China. Wild Swans Three Daughters of China, Jung Chang, Flamingo: An imprint of Harper Collins, paperback (1992). Jung Chang recounts the evocative, unsettling, and insistently gripping story of how three generations of women in her family fared in the political maelstrom of China during the 20th century. Chang's grandmother was a warlord's concubine. Her gently raised mother struggled with hardships in the early days of Mao's revolution and rose, like her husband, to a prominent position in the Communist Party before being denounced during the Cultural Revolution. Chang herself marched, worked, and breathed for Mao until doubt crept in over the excesses of his policies and purges. Born just a few decades apart, their lives overlap with the end of the warlords' regime and overthrow of the Japanese occupation, violent

struggles between the Kuomintang and the Communists to carve up China, and, most poignant for the author, the vicious cycle of purges orchestrated by Chairman Mao that discredited and crushed millions of people, including her parents. Born in 1929 in a Tibetan village, Tsering became part of the Dalai Lama's personal dance troupe at 13 years. After studying in the US he returned to Tibet in 1964 convinced that Tibet could become a modernized society based on socialist, egalitarian principles through cooperation with the Chinese.
